

OREGON CHILD DEVELOPMENT COALITION 2010 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Thanks to the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA), Oregon Child Development Coalition (OCDC) received a Migrant Seasonal Early Head Start \$10,000,000 over two years resulting in:
 - o 352 new infants and toddlers children and families served in Oregon
 - o 44 new classrooms opened across seven counties
 - o 180 new employees hired
 - o 13 new buses purchased
 - o 11 Parent Apprentices entered the educational workforce
 - \$400,000 renovations completed to OCDC center in Ontario, Oregon
- Thanks to continued funding of the Head Start Act:
 - OCDC offered educational, health, dental and social services to 3,077 Migrant and Seasonal children and their families
 - OCDC opened a new state of the art building with best practice classroom and playground design for 169 children in Mulino, Oregon and
 - OCDC expanded the Migrant program by 90 families in South Marion County/Salem
- Thanks to Oregon State Legislative Initiatives, OCDC is operating:
 - A 'Promotora' Program in seven rural counties from the Oregon Department of Human Services to increase enrollment of children in the Oregon Health Plan and Healthy Kids

EDUCATION AND SUPPORT SERVICES:

- 3,077 children and families served in the Migrant and Seasonal Head Start Program
- 641 children and families served in the Oregon PreKindergarten
- 478,696 meals provided with \$1,765,000 with USDA dollars
- 540,000 miles of bus transportation offered
- 17,000 home visits completed

EMPLOYMENT AND WORK FORCE DEVELOPMENT:

- 1,478 personnel employed
- 180 new jobs due to Early Head Start funding
- In collaboration with the US Department of Agriculture, OCDC offered a "Summer Supper Program" in which 20,000 meals were served in addition to the typical offerings
- In collaboration with the Oregon Dental Association Tooth Taxi, OCDC provided over \$110,000 of preventive and restorative dental care to OCDC children, siblings and low income children
- In collaboration with Ecotrust, OCDC operates a Garden Project Initiative designed to help families make nutritious choices and learn how to grow food in their own neighborhoods
